There are no quick methods to train your dog	We treat dogs as though they are sentient beings, and they have the right to say no. Training is conducted at the dog's pace to avoid undue stress and unnecessary applications of harsh training methodologies.
Training an assistance dog slowly equates to fast.	When training at your dog's pace, you avoid having to undo unwanted behaviours or taking rest bites due to stress. Avoiding burnout in your dog is just as important as avoiding burnout in you.
Management	90% of puppy training is management. Management protects your puppy from developing unwanted skills that then need to be rectified.
What will occur if your dog doesn't make the grade?	As some dogs do not qualify as assistance dogs, it is worth having a backup plan, just in case your dog doesn't cope with the work or make the required standards. Will you still keep him? Re-home him? Try again with a different dog. These are all questions worth considering before you embark on this journey.
